This is the third intersection in the lwata to be so made, following the intersection in front of Iwata Police Box and the intersection in front of Nakaiwata Seven-Eleven. By pressing a push button, the lights all change to pedestrian-only, allowing diagonal crossing. The intersection is on a school route and is used by many children and students on their way to and from school. For this reason, Iwata Elementary School and the Iwata residents' association have been requesting that the crossing be made into a scramble crossing for many years. Although this will be a convenient signal for pedestrians, we ask that students who commute by bicycle take caution when passing through the intersection.
